

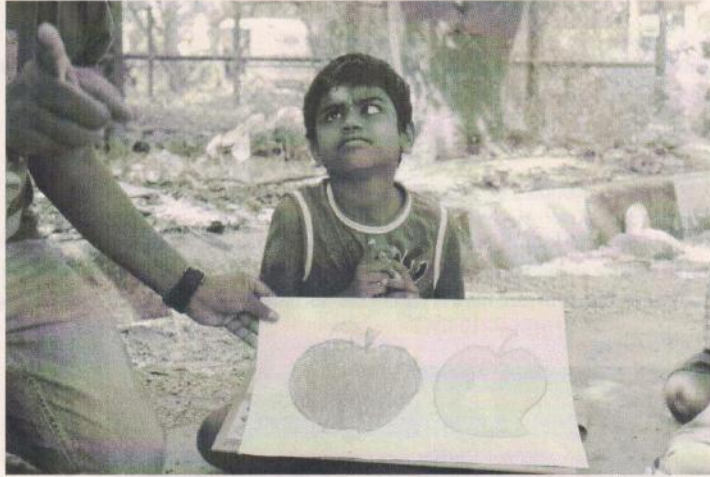

## Open street for autistic children on Saturday

**BENGALURU:** The open street theme will be utilised for a good cause this Saturday, as children with autism will be able to play and interact with other children on earmarked streets, safe from flowing traffic, in HSR layout.

### Activities galore

Termed 'Autism Fest', the event will be held at 15<sup>th</sup> Cross in HSR layout, between 9.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m., on the occasion of Autism Day. In line will be a play arena, sports like football, bowling, indoor games like snakes and ladders and chess, as

well as events such as painting, origami and street dramas.

"The idea is to make parents comfortable with bringing their children on the street and letting them enjoy, so that the message of social acceptance is promoted. Parents will be able to get their queries answered. Speech pathologists present at the event will take questions," said Juhi Ramani, who works with I Support Foundation, one of the organisers of the event.

### Spreading awareness

The team has also created an app, available on Google

Play Store, called 'Autism Care' which helps create awareness among family members who have children with autism.

"We had to think about each step and factor in issues like tree shade, duration, banning speakers to avoid noise and assistance from partners like the Traffic Police, Narayana Hospital and speech pathologists.

The games are also different keeping in mind the requirements of the children," Ms. Ramani said.

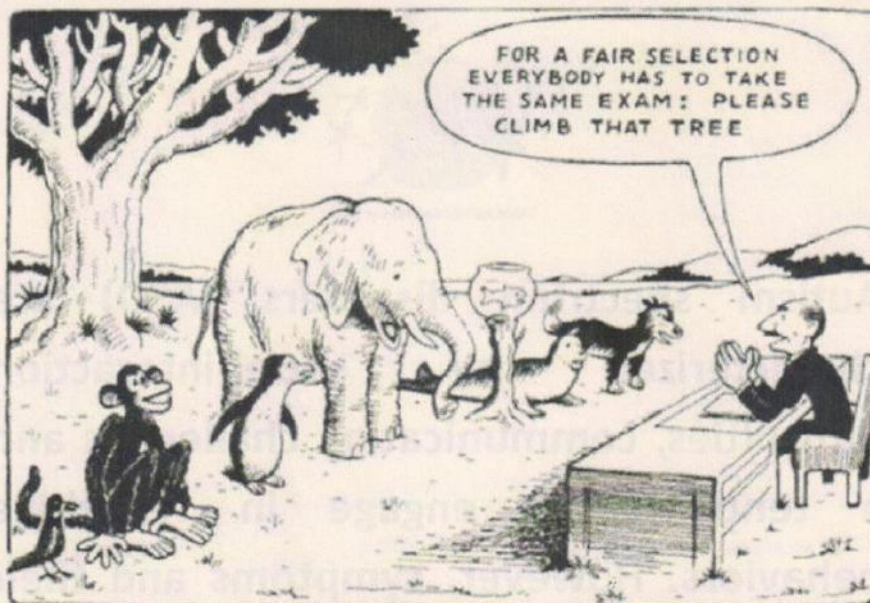
