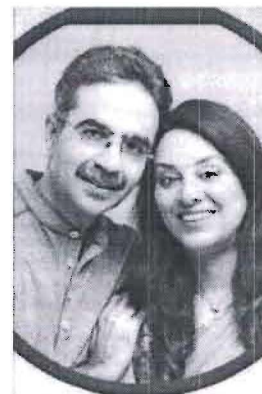

Action Plan:

1. To identify experts in the area of Attitude Development.
2. Request these experts to be members of the Advisory Body and Executive Body.
3. After the centre is structured, hold a meeting of the Advisory Body.
4. Elicit suggestions and opinions of the experts.
5. Compare these opinions with the proceedings of the Round Table conference held on 10th Sept 2016 at FKCCI cabinet Hall, K G Road , Bangalore.
6. To carry out thorough prior planning in terms of defining the attributes or components of attitude education suitable for different stages in education viz.,
 - i) Primary school
 - ii) Higher Primary
 - iii) High School
 - iv) P U College
 - v) Graduation & Post Graduation

(On the basis of theory of constructivism)

7. To seek the necessary support from various sources for training the facilitators
8. To identify the schools and colleges to impart Attitude Education and to discuss with the respective Heads of the Institutions. (Criteria to be decided to select the institutions)
9. To include the parents of the students identified for Attitude Education with a view to facilitate the re-inforcement of the content imparted at home also.
10. Resource persons to be identified to handle the sessions.
11. Before launching the programme ,to contact the concerned authorities –
 - i) Director of primary education
 - ii) Directorate of secondary education
 - iii) Directorate of Pre University Education
 - iv) Directorate of Collegiate Education & Higher Education
12. The outcome of the programme launched has to be forwarded to the Ministry of HRD which will in turn be sent to the Prime Minister.

Proceedings of the Meeting

Views of experts :

- 1) Dr Gururaj Karajagi – Chairman, Academy for Creative Teaching, Bangalore ;
Chief Guest – Key Note Address

Dr Gururaj Karajagi, the Chief Guest, in his key note address emphasized on the need for moulding the attitudes of the younger generation because they are more focused, better informed. Due to the competition that is existing in the present days, the youngsters have become more aggressive. Hence there is a need to refine them by way of attitude development. Dr Karajagi was of the opinion that Attitude is not just a wish, it is also hard work. We have to give examples of great people to make the youngsters realize that success is not by chance, but it comes through inculcating and holding on to the right attitude since it is the attitude which gets tested more than knowledge and skills. To be successful, we need three things viz. Knowledge , Skills and Attitude. Further, Knowledge and Skills are functions of Attitude.

2) Sri. K G SubbaramaSetty– Hon. Treasurer, R V Group of Institutions, Bangalore-
Presidential remarks

Sri SubbaramaSetty, in his presidential address stressed on the need for effective implementation of the ideas generated during the Round Table Conference. It should go to the macro level and not be confined to the micro youth population. He said that a country cannot progress if its youth are not trained well. Hence it is essential for educational institutions to bring such thinking among the youth. He suggested that training should start from a very young age. He reiterated the importance of character building among the youth by giving examples of Sir. M. Vishweshwaraya and Dr. A P J Abdul Kalam.

3) Sri. A R Chandrashekar- Founder, Mission Benevolence, Bangalore

Mr A R Chandrashekar, the founder of Mission Benevolence, a social Service Organization, spoke about the need for attitude. He stressed on the fact that attitude education cannot be imparted through formal education , but on the other hand it can be effectively imparted through informal education which is goal oriented. The focus should be on value based education since empowered youth is the essential pre requisite for a sustainable future.

4) Dr. SrikantaSwamy- Former Professor, R V Teachers' College and Former Additional Director Research, Christ University, Bangalore, Panelist

DrSrikantaSwamy endorsed the views of MrChandrashekar and said that more importance should be given for value based education. He said that there is a need for paradigm shift from formal education to informal. Further formal system can be strengthened by adding the dimension of attitude development.He was of the opinion that present day youth are more worried about standard of living than quality of living. Hence he said that empowerment of youth should happen at all levels without which, countries cannot be developed. DrSrikantaSwamy mentioned about the three components of attitude from the psychological perspective viz. Cognitive, Affective, and Behavioural(Learning). He said that assessment is an integral part to identify the change in attitudes among the students.

5) Dr. N S Ramegowda – Former Vice Chancellor, KSOU, Mysore -Panelist

Dr. N. S Ramegowda suggested that attitude education to be imparted through non formal system. He stressed on the fact that education has three components which are equally important. They are – Knowledge, Skills and Attitude which have to be given an equal weightage of 1/3rd each. He said that non formal system is easier as compared to the rigid formal system. He gave certain suggestions which are as follows:

- i) Self -instruction material to be prepared and to examine whether equal weightage has been assigned to each of the above components.
- ii) Regarding assessment of students, as mentioned in the approach paper, he suggested that certain formats have to be developed for self -assessment on the lines of UGC formats.
- iii) At the end of the course, when the students make a presentation before the panel of experts, a standard set of questions have to be developed which can be asked to the students to check their understanding of the topics.
- iv) He further suggested to escalate this course to the university level by way of sending a proposal to the UGC to include attitude education as a course.

6) Dr. M K Sridhar- Professor, Department of Management studies, Jnana Bharathi Campus, Bangalore University, Bangalore-Panelist

Dr. M K Sridhar was of the opinion that the concept of attitude education which has been taken up as the theme for the Round Table conference is indeed an innovative and interesting attempt. He said that the formal education system has failed in developing the right attitude among the youth.

- i) He was of the opinion that the entire attitude development framework including framing the syllabus, Teaching-Learning Process, and Class room delivery, all have to part of the formal system.
- ii) He said that our attitude, i.e, the attitude of the educators towards the youth has to be positive, otherwise the youth cannot be developed.
- iii) He stressed on the importance of the fact that attitude of role models/attitude education providers is reflected in the attitude of youth.
- iv) He suggested that 2-3 experimental models have to be developed before the actual implementation of the same.

7) **Dr. N S Vishwanath- Director, M P Birla Institute of management studies, Bangalore-Panelist**

Dr N S Vishwanath, spoke about the fact that as teachers, we are all facing this problem of attitude. He said that according to The Guna theory, attitude of the youth is determined by the parents, and the kind of environment provided at home. He raised the question as to whether attitude education should be formal or non-formal. He was of the opinion that youth should be educated for life and not just for certification. He suggested that this type of education is best possible through role models. To create the right attitude, it is necessary to create interest through activities, i.e emphasis on activity based learning.

He also emphasized on the assessment of the learners since it is important to know how much of the attitude education has been internalized.

8) **Dr Wooday P Krishna- Hon. Gen Secretary, Seshadripuram Educational Trust, Bangalore -Panelist**

Dr Wooday P Krishna was of the opinion that Nation Building can happen only through developing our youth. He spoke about the holistic development of youth as propagated by Swami Vivekanada as the process of man-making. He stressed on the need for helping the youth to think big and building good thoughts. He said that by way of global mind set, the youth will be able to manage across boundaries and across religions. This can help the youth to become self-reliant and also will be able to transform ideas into creativity. He emphasized on the need for training people to be productivity oriented through effective time management and prioritizing one's needs.

9) **Sri D M Kiran –Managing Director iSOL talent consulting, Bangalore-Panelist**

Sri D M Kiran spoke about the present day scenario which is the era of specialization and the era of information. The youth have the opportunity to realize their career goals provided they have the right attitude. Hence, he said that attitude education play a predominant role. He also endorsed the view that activity based learning or experiential learning is the preferred method of imparting attitude education

10) Sri B P G Raju – Management Consultant, Bangalore -Panelist

Sri B P G Raju said that attitude education should be made part of the curriculum and some of the integral items of assessment should be included. He emphasized on the fact that the present day youth expect appreciation for even small achievements. Hence some motivational measures like Best Behaviour Award should be instituted.

11) Prof Lakshman Prasad – Principal, VVN P U College, Bangalore -Panelist

Prof Lakshman Prasad strongly endorsed the view that the attitude of the teacher plays an important role in determining the attitude of the learner. He said that there is a dearth of good teachers who can positively bring about a change in the attitude of the youth. He was of the opinion that the attitude education course that has been designed should take into consideration the aspect of right implementation.

12) Sri Raghavendra S Rao – Advocate and Member, Mission Benevolence, Bangalore-Panelist

Sri Raghavendra emphasized on the fact that it is important to develop the attitude of not only the youth but everyone. He said that in what manner every child needs to be educated has to be considered. To teach attitude, the teacher needs to have the right attitude. He said that yoga and meditation can contribute to a greater extent towards attitude development.

13) Sri Prasad –Law Educator and member, Mission Benevolence, Bangalore- Panelist

Mr Prasad was of the opinion that attitude is nothing but the approach and the individual mindset. He endorsed the views of the other panelists regarding the need for the right attitude of the teacher who imparts attitude education. He said that the attitude education syllabus has to take care of the wider dimension in order to be effectively implemented.

14) Dr.Krishna, CEO, Ramanuja Management Services, Bangalore - Panelist

- We cannot eliminate the role played by our scriptures, religion, parents and teachers in shaping attitude of a person

1. Development and nurture the belief that the entire human race is a single family of human beings and inculcate the feeling of brother-hood towards all fellow beings
2. Love all Hate None
3. Live and Let live
4. Enrich the dignity and significance of your life with incessant acquisition of the gainful and enlightening knowledge on various subjects, religions and cultures
5. Get rid of Jealous, Bias, Pride and Prejudice
6. Develop scientific temperament in search of the Truth, Justice, Fairness and Equity while dealing with the affairs and problems of men and their matters
7. Keep the mind free of indoctrination with any Utopia, Dogma or Doctrine and Policy which is likely to pollute and disturb the social atmosphere of the peaceful co-existence of the different groups, classes and communities of the country
8. Develop altruistic nature for the selfless service to the mega bonds, destitute, downtrodden and poverty stricken segments of the society to the extent possible.

16) Dr. Arathi, Trainer, Academy for Creative Teaching, Bangalore- panelist

- We need to teach our youth to accept or digest a "No"/Failure/Disappointment
- A country that has forgotten its past has no future – Swami Vivekananda
- Youth should be taught to connect to their Grandparents, about Indian Culture and Indian country
- We need to develop the strong cultural identity about India like our tradition, culture, food, dress etc.,
- We need to make our youth more conscious about being practical and realistic
- We need to educate youth about our Indian role models like Indian Lawyers, Indian Scientists, Indian Kings and Indian Leaders
- We need to draw insights from the past to go ahead because it is only from the root every tree derives its water and energy as cutting off the roots will never make the tree stand

17) Mr.Suresh Moona, Director – Aarambh , Bangalore -Panelist

- Syllabus and study-materials should be based on Role Models based in Indian Country so that it will reach more number of Indian youth because they will identify themselves with the person.
- Ex: Mahatma Gandhi, Swami Vivekananda, Rabindranath Tagore etc
- Local Examples: Ms.Janaki, Swimmer, State Bank
- Biographies of Indian Achievers should be made as a part of syllabus so that Indian youth can take them as role models after reading how they have achieved in their life
- Credibility and credentials of the teachers who is going to impart this attitude development course should be given more importance
- Achievements of our own Indian Achievers should be taught to youth so that they will consider them as role model and try to emulate them
- If we develop right kind of attitude among youth at their younger age, then, if he becomes a politician, bureaucrat, they will act in a responsible manner

18) Dr.GopalanNarasimhan – Founder Director of Bumble Bee Leadership Academy, Bangalore -Panelist

- An experiential reflective learning will only bring about a behavioral change
- Cultural heritage and Traditional system should be combined with modern methods and modern technologies so that youth can be reached out in a much easier manner
- Combination of activity based experiential reflective learning combined with certain technologies; scientific methods can bring about a significant result
- Real learning happens through informal or non-formal atmosphere
- Designing the structured curriculum based on activities (individual activity/group activity/expert lectures) to be carried out to inspire the youth to get into action.
- Evaluation/ Assessment
- Assessment Centre/Development Centre concept should be used in evaluation
- Even the Behavioral aspects need to be considered for evaluation

- Beliefs and mindset related aspects could be measured by some kind of models wherein competencies can be defined and measured in a structured way
- Different levels of development of competencies should be defined and measured
- Sense of purpose or sense of direction should be given to them to prepare them to face the life as responsible citizen

19) Dr.RamuChanna, Bio informatics Consultant, Bangalore - Panelist

- Attitude should be blended in all the subjects and not as a separate one

20) Mr.C.S.Ravi, Nokia – Product Management Division, Bangalore - Panelist

- Our actions and words are reflections of our thoughts which are nothing but called as attitude.
- Two forces are generating the thoughts:
 - Genes inherited from our parents
 - Environment
- The following factors play an important role in shaping the attitude of a person:
 - Parents
 - Relatives
 - Friends
 - Exposure
- Food we eat (Spicy food increases the levels of Jealousy, hatred, anger etc., Oily food tends to make people lazy)
- Attitude development course/subject should not be offered to mass like any other course/subject.
- Individual focus/attention to be given

Each student has to be understood in detail before the attitude course is imparted to them or admitting them into the course.

21) Dr K Shesha Murthy – Former Principal, Vijaya College, Bangalore -Moderator

DrShesha Murthy moderated the entire session and also gave the concluding remarks. He thanked all the panelists for their valuable inputs.
